

Beautification Board Information



A new pest has made itself at home in Brevard County: spiraling whitefly.

It is easily recognizable due to the egg pattern the pest lays on the underside of leaf and fronds, i.e., a spiral.

Usually the first symptom of an infested plant is a fuzzy white coating; in extreme cases black sooty mold forms on the affected areas.

Luckily it is easily treated with any product containing imidicloprid as the active ingredient.
