## From the Council Desk

### Proud Stewards of Our Environment

I was recently asked what Satellite Beach does for the natural environment. While I know that this is one of our City's greatest strengths, I had to review our history to recall the many details. Here's what I rediscovered.

**Beach Parks.** With support from our residents expressed in a 1980s referendum and multiple surveys over the years, a remarkable **40% of Satellite Beach's 2.8 miles of oceanfront is now publicly owned** and managed by our City. This has prevented the dense oceanfront development found in all other beachside communities in Brevard and enabled us to preserve valuable vegetative and animal habitat. Using City-owned rights-of-way; land and monetary donations, and our City's aggressive pursuit of millions of dollars in grant funds, we have purchased and developed the following beach areas for habitat preservation and recreation:



- **Hightower Beach Park.** This **18.4-acre nature preserve and beachfront park** resulted from a grant-funded purchase of 15.3 acres in 1999; a Brevard County donation of 1.6 acres in 2012; 1.5 acres owned by the State of Florida; and contributions for improvements from the Montecito Community Development District, the Satellite Beach Woman's Club, the National Park Service, and our Community Redevelopment Agency. (Of the \$3.8 million purchase cost, our City paid less than \$7,000.) In **2010**, Hightower received the **Florida Redevelopment Award** from the Florida Redevelopment Association, and the **U.S. National Park Service's annual report to Congress** featured a beautiful picture of Hightower Beach Park on its front cover.
- **Pelican Beach Park.** In 2001, grant funds and a Woman's Club donation allowed us to extend Pelican's quarter-mile-long oceanfront (donated to us by Brevard County in 2012) to one-third of a mile, adding **1.8 acres of natural habitat** to create a **10.5-acre park**.
- **Crotty Park.** In 2005, our Community Redevelopment Agency purchased this **1-acre oceanfront parcel**, preserving one of the very few remaining places where the **ocean can still be seen from SR A1A**. Only minimal public amenities will be added to this park.
- **Gemini Park.** In 2006, a developer with approved plans to build a 20-unit condo tower on this **1.9-acre oceanfront parcel** (across from Ellwood Avenue) donated it to our City in exchange for being allowed to transfer those 20 units to the condo tower he plans for the former Ramada Inn site (across from Atlantic Plaza). This additional beachfront open space will provide a **neighborhood park with beach access for pedestrians and bicyclists**, while keeping as much of its natural state as possible.
- **Beach Accesses.** Determined to make our natural ocean environment easily accessible to the public, our City has **16 dune crossovers** (averaging less than 1,000 feet between them). The one on Shell Street was extensively renovated a few months ago with a large donation from the Woman's Club; the ones at Hightower and Pelican Beach Parks are handicapped accessible; and a **17th crossover** will be added (across from Atlantic Plaza).

**Samsons Island.** A jungle of invasive exotic vegetation at the end of the 1980s, Samsons Island has been transformed by grants and countless volunteers and manhours into a **52-acre nature preserve and passive recreation park** cleared of exotics, with paths, picnic and educational pavilions, camp sites, and a handicapped-accessible restroom. Gopher tortoises needing relocation from construction sites outside our City have been brought to our island, which abounds with birds and other wildlife. To ensure that everyone can enjoy this unique visit with nature, our Recreation Department provides free wheelchair-accessible boat rides to the island on weekends. In recognition of this restoration work, in **1994** our City received the first **Governor's Excellence in Coastal Management Award** from Governor Lawton Chiles and was designated the **Coastal Local Government of the Year**.


**Sports and Recreation Park.** This park is home to the last existing **oak scrub habitat (8 acres)** between the Pineda and Eau Gallie Causeways, as well as a large variety of **wildlife**, including **gopher tortoises**. Preserving this is a priority for our City, and plans are underway to thin the vegetation in this now-overgrown area to restore habitat that supports the wildlife living there.

**Indian River Lagoon.** Our City has taken numerous actions to raise awareness and help the Lagoon.

- **Stormwater Management.** Since the 1990s, we have successfully pursued grants funds (more than \$6 million awarded since 2000) to **upgrade our stormwater drainage system**, not only to prevent street flooding, but also to trap nutrients (nitrogen and phosphorus) before they can reach the Lagoon. As a result, in **1998** our City received the **St. Johns River Water Management District's Water Resource Partnership Award for Water Quality/Flood Protection**. And in **2002**, the **U.S. EPA's Clean Water Partners Program** recognized our City for our Lagoon and oceanfront preservation efforts. Now plans are being made to create an attractive **stormwater pond at DeSoto Park**. And we continue to look for new economically-feasible technologies to reduce the nutrients in our stormwater.
- **Muck Removal.** Since the 1990s, our City has removed muck from our **finger canals** as funds allowed. Now we are sharing costs with Indian Harbour Beach to survey and map the location and quantity of muck in our canals to expedite having them added to Brevard County's State-funded muck-removal project.
- **Council Actions.** Through **ordinances** or **resolutions**, our City has **limited impervious surfaces** to allow rainfall to soak into the ground rather than run off into the Lagoon; **regulated fertilizer use** to reduce nitrogen and phosphorus entering the Lagoon; supported making **Lagoon restoration** a priority; supported a compact with Brevard, Volusia, and Indian River municipalities to help restore the Lagoon and lobby the Legislature for cleanup funding; supported additional research into Lagoon restoration; and published three **special-edition Beachcasters** since 1997 to raise residents' awareness about the Lagoon. In addition, our City Manager serves on the Space Coast League of Cities' Environmental Committee to assist the Marine Resources Council in devising Lagoon-restoration strategies.

**Energy Efficiency.** Since a 2000 **energy audit** of our City's five primary buildings by the Florida Solar Energy Center, we have pursued energy savings. For example, with help from a federal grant, we have replaced our **Civic Center's** antiquated air conditioning and lighting; and **Public Works** uses small utility carts (one of them electric) instead of trucks whenever feasible.

**Resiliency.** This concept is the ability to bounce back quickly from any negative impacts of **coastal hazards**, including **sea-level rise**. Our City's intent is to avoid what happened in South Florida, where they waited until water was in their streets during high tide to address the issue. Since 2010, our resiliency



actions include working with Brevard County to **stabilize our beach**; obtaining a professional evaluation of our vulnerability to **coastal flooding and erosion**, and amending our Comprehensive Plan to address those findings; soliciting residents' opinions online regarding coastal hazards and their preferred responses to them; and having Stetson University map our **infrastructure elevations** to help us plan for sea-level rise. In 2014, **National Public Radio** aired an 8-minute segment on our resiliency efforts.

**Sustainability.** This concept covers the numerous ways we can coexist in harmony with nature to support current and future generations. Our City has pursued **green practices** since the late 1980s, when we were the first Brevard city to have **curbside recycling**. In some of our actions since then, we have required **native plants** for new landscapes and **removal of invasive exotic trees** from properties in our City (with funding assistance to remove mature Brazilian pepper trees); **xeriscaped** public areas, created **specialized recycling areas** at the Schechter Center, installed an **electric-car charging station** at Pelican Beach Park (with more to come); and supported **water conservation**, Earth Day, and a ban on fracking. Now a highly-committed group of residents on our new **Sustainability Board** is taking sustainable practices to the next level, developing a **Comprehensive Sustainability Plan** for our City (with technical assistance from Florida Tech) and pursuing projects involving a **community garden** at DeSoto Park, **Lagoon restoration**, **reusable bags**, **sustainable lawn care**, **solar energy**, **LED lighting**, and other ideas. More will be coming soon from this Board.

## City Election on November 8th

An election for a **Mayor** and **two City Council seats** will be held on Tuesday, November 8, 2016. Mayor Frank Catino, Vice-Mayor Mark Brimer, and Councilwoman Lorraine Gott are eligible for re-election. The City Council consists of four Councilmembers and Mayor who are elected at-large by the City's voters. They **all serve without salary**, but are compensated for expenses as provided by the City Code. They may serve two full consecutive terms.

**Qualifications:** A candidate for City Council must be a **registered voter** who has been a **resident of the City for at least one year prior to the date of qualifying** and who has filed the necessary documents with the City Clerk **between August 11 - 24, 2016**.

## Police Update on Phone Scams

The Police Department would like to warn our residents about two common phone scams:

**Family member scam.** A caller claims they are a grandchild and in some type of trouble after being arrested abroad. They ask the target victim not to call their parents or they will be in more trouble and then they beg for help with bail and fine money. Many grandparents have become victims to this scam. Often they ask for Visa gift cards to be purchased and they will call back asking for the codes on the cards. Once the money is gone, it is almost always unrecoverable.

**IRS tax scam.** The caller will sound very official and say they are an IRS investigator and the target victim owes back taxes that must be paid immediately to avoid an arrest warrant being issued. The callers can be very aggressive. They demand money be wired and it ends up going through multiple channels and again, is almost impossible to trace.

- **NEVER wire money** unless you personally know the recipient.
- **NEVER pay over the phone with gift cards.** No legitimate business would ask a customer to do this
- **NEVER** send cash to anyone who claims to have "accidentally" overpaid for a Craigslist item by money order.
- **ALWAYS** stay informed of the most recent scams and don't allow yourself to become a victim. **If it doesn't sound right, STOP and call the police for direction.** 321-773-4400



## City continues with Waste Management

On June 1, 2016, our City's **new 10-year contract** with Waste Management went into effect. Consistent with our long history of environmental advocacy, Waste Management was chosen for both their excellent service record and their environmentally-friendly initiative to replace their diesel fleet with compressed natural gas vehicles.

### What's new?

- **Lower Rates.** For this first year, monthly **residential** rates will **decrease by 7.76%** (from \$15.59 to \$14.38) and monthly **commercial** rates will **decrease by 7.33%** (from \$6.14 per cubic yard to \$5.69).
- **Faster Special Pickups.** To ensure that no solid waste remains uncollected over weekends, special pickups requested by any customer (residential or commercial) for large volumes that cannot fit into carts must be picked up within three business days or by the first Friday after Waste Management is notified, whichever comes first. These **special solid-waste pickups** can include household trash/garbage, commercial trash, bulk waste, white goods (home appliances), vegetative yard waste, and electronic waste.
- **Choice of Cart Size.** Residents may **exchange** 64-gallon **carts** for 96-gallon carts, or vice versa.
- **Upcoming Solar Trash Compactors.** Later this year, Waste Management will install solar trash compactors at **Hightower Beach Park** and **Pelican Beach Park**.

### What stays the same?

- **Types and Days of Residential Service.** We will still have **recycling** and **vegetative yard waste** pickup on Monday, and **household trash/garbage** pickup on Tuesday and Friday. Uncarted piles of vegetative yard waste may be picked up on another day (but within three business days or by the next Friday).
- **Collection Hours.** All residential and commercial pickups will occur **between the hours of 7am and 7pm**, with exceptions allowed only for school properties (to ensure the safety of children) and certain commercial properties (to avoid blocked traffic and backing hazards on congested roadways).
- **Holiday Rescheduling.** When the County landfill is closed on holidays that fall on our regular collection days (e.g., **Memorial Day, 4<sup>th</sup> of July, Veterans Day, or Christmas**), missed pickups will occur on the next regularly-scheduled collection day for that material.
- **Special Pickup Locations.** Disabled or elderly residents may contact City Hall or Waste Management to request **backdoor or side-yard pickup** at no additional cost.
- **Fluorescent Bulb Disposal.** Residents may request a **bag for collection and disposal** of fluorescent bulbs and request a special pickup when the bag is full.
- **Additional Carts.** All customers may **purchase additional carts**.

**Online Tracking.** A special customer-focused tool Waste Management uses is their online tracking system to record **service requests, complaints, compliments, and other comments**. The system also allows City staff to monitor the quality of service that Waste Management is providing, so we encourage all residents and businesses to use this system. ## Sea Turtle Nesting Observance

As you may be aware by now, sea turtle nesting season is already very active this year! From **May 1 until October 31** it is not only disrespectful to create light on the beach, but also illegal, which is why NO bonfire permits are issued during the turtle nesting season. While Brevard County and its municipalities have local lighting ordinances in place to protect sea turtles, residents and visitors are reminded to shield or turn off beachside lights, limit beach walking at night, **avoid using flash photography** on the beach, and stay away from nesting sea turtles, hatchlings, or sea turtle nests.

Florida Wildlife Commission (FWC) asks that **residents and visitors** remember these **turtle-friendly practices**:

- **Remain at a distance from nesting sea turtles and hatchlings.**
- **Remove chairs, canopies, boats and other items from the beach at night,** because they block the movement of turtles and hatchlings.
- **Turn off or shield lights along the beach,** in order to prevent nesting females or hatchlings from getting confused and going toward lights on land instead of the salt water, where they belong.
- **Avoid using lights on the beach at night.** If you must have light, use a red LED flashlight, adjust cell phone screens to dark mode and don't take flash photos.
- **Fill in holes** in the sand at the end of the day, so nesting sea turtles and hatchlings don't fall in and get stuck there at night.
- Correctly **dispose of fishing line,** so it won't entangle sea turtles and other animals.
- Remember it is illegal to harm, harass or take sea turtles, their eggs and hatchlings, including getting too close to a nesting female.



## From the Beautification Board

With the summer heat upon us, it's getting harder to find motivation to work out in the yard. We can keep our cool and help out the environment by making small changes to our landscaping practices. **Maybe it's time to try xeriscaping.**

Xeriscaping is landscaping with **slow-growing, drought-tolerant plants** to conserve water and establish a waste-efficient landscape. Benefits include cost savings through **lower water bills** and **reduction in the labor needed to maintain your landscape**. Consider **adding native plants** to your landscape such as beach sunflower (pictured), muhly grass, coontie, silver buttonwood, spider lily or even yaupon holly. Besides being salt and drought-tolerant, these plants will also be beneficial to our native wildlife.
