FEMA to states like Florida: no climate planning, no money

The Federal Emergency Management Agency is making it tougher for governors to deny man-made climate change. Starting next year, the agency will approve disaster preparedness funds only for states whose governors approve hazard mitigation plans that address climate change.

This may put several Republican governors who maintain the earth isn't warming due to human activities, or prefer to do nothing about it, into a political bind. Their position may block their states' access to hundreds of millions of dollars in FEMA funds. Over the past five years, the agency has awarded an average \$1 billion a year in grants to states and territories for taking steps to mitigate the effects of disasters.

From 2010 to 2014, Florida received about \$260 million.

"If a state has a climate denier governor that doesn't want to accept a plan, that would risk mitigation work not getting done because of politics," said Becky Hammer, an attorney with the Natural Resources Defense Council's water program. "The governor would be increasing the risk to citizens in that state" because of his climate beliefs.

The policy doesn't affect federal money for relief after a hurricane, flood or other disaster. Specifically, beginning in March 2016, states seeking preparedness money will have to assess how climate change threatens their communities. Governors will have to sign off on hazard mitigation plans. While some states, including New York, have already started incorporating climate risks in their plans, most haven't because FEMA's old 2008 guidelines didn't require it.

"This could potentially become a major conflict for several Republican governors," said Barry Rabe, an expert on the politics of climate change at the University of Michigan. "We aren't just talking about coastal states." Climate change affects droughts, rainfall and tornado activity. Fracking is being linked to more earthquakes, he said. "This could affect state leaders across the country."

Among those who could face a difficult decision are Republican Govs. Rick Scott of Florida, Bobby Jindal of Louisiana, Chris Christie of New Jersey, Greg Abbott of Texas and Pat McCrory of North Carolina — all of whom have denied man-made climate change or refused to take action. The states they lead face immediate threats from climate change.

The five governors' offices did not return requests for comment.

Environmentalists have been pressing FEMA to include global warming in its hazard mitigation guidelines for almost three years. FEMA told the Natural Resources Defense Council in early 2014 that it would revise the guidelines. It issued draft rules last October and officially released the new procedures last week as partisan politics around climate change have been intensifying.

On March 8, the Florida Center for Investigative Reporting said the Scott administration instituted an unwritten ban on the use of "climate change" or "global warming" by Florida officials. Gov. Scott denied the claim, telling reporters in Tallahassee, "Well, first off, that's not true. At our Department of Environmental Protection, there's lots of conversation about this issue. From my standpoint, like every issue, my goal is: Instead of talking about it, let's do something about it."

Still the group Public Employees for Environmental Responsibility has filed a complaint arguing that a state employee, Bart Bibler of the Department of Environmental Protection, was reprimanded for speaking about climate change at an official meeting and keeping notes on the subject in official minutes.

The complaint says that on March 9, Bibler got a letter of reprimand, was ordered to take two days leave and then was told not to return until he had medical clearance of his fitness for duty.

"There's no such policy banning the use of 'climate change,'" DEP spokeswoman Lauren Engel told the *Palm Beach Post*. She had no specific comment on the Bibler case, the *Post* reported.

In the reprimand letter, provided by PEER to the *Palm Beach Post*, Marianne Gengenbach, chief of environmental services, said Bibler "engaged in personal political advocacy related to the Keystone XL Pipeline" and that he provided his supervisors a summary suggesting climate change was on the agenda when it wasn't.

"Your actions were disrespectful, unprofessional and represent insubordination," Gengenbach wrote.

According to PEER's complaint, Bibler — currently land management plan coordinator for DEP's Division of State Lands — attended a Florida Coastal Managers Forum on Feb. 27 at which climate change and sea-level rise were discussed.

PEER said Bibler later "was directed to remove any hot button issues, especially explicit references to climate change, and then was given a letter of reprimand for supposedly misrepresenting that the 'official meeting agenda included climate change.'"

FEMA wrote in its new procedures, "The challenges posed by climate change, such as more intense storms, frequent heavy precipitation, heat waves, drought, extreme flooding, and higher sea levels, could significantly alter the types and magnitudes of hazards impacting states in the future."


FEMA's disaster preparedness program has been granting money to states since the 1980s for projects as diverse as raising buildings out of floodplains and building safe rooms. States are required to update their plans every five years to be eligible for the agency's mitigation funding. Since 2010, FEMA has doled out more than \$4.6 billion to states and territories as part of this program.

Republican-led regions constitute 8 of the top 10 recipients of this category of FEMA money between 2010 and 2014. Louisiana was No. 1, having received almost \$1.1 billion from FEMA for hazard mitigation. New Jersey was third with nearly \$379 million, and Texas fourth with almost \$343 million. Florida was sixth.

The gubernatorial approval clause was included in the new guidelines to "raise awareness and support for implementing the actions in the mitigation strategy and increasing statewide resilience to natural hazards," said FEMA spokeswoman Susan Hendrick.

The new federal rules don't require public involvement in the creation of states' disaster preparedness plans, eliminating the opportunity for environmental groups and concerned citizens to submit comments or concerns about the assessments.

In an effort to better safeguard our citizens and visitors who frequent our Brevard County beaches, the Brevard County Parks and Recreation Department, in cooperation with Brevard County Ocean Rescue, has installed new Rip Current Warning signs on all County controlled beach crossovers. These improved signs have a Quick Response (QR) code and a telephone number so beach patrons can access locations of lifeguarded beaches, but also receive emergency text alerts should inclement weather be approaching.

In the spirit of cooperation, we would like to offer your municipality these new Rip Current signs, at no cost, to provide these services to your beach patrons. We presented the concept of a new Rip Current sign and explained the benefits to the Tourist Development Council (TDC). The TDC provided the funding for the sign construction realizing the value of the enhanced safety measures through the information provided.

With a number of rip current related incidents in the Brevard County surf over the last 10 years, new innovative measures must be taken to provide the necessary safety for our beach patrons. We must understand informational signage alone does not guarantee that all safety measures are taken, however we believe the installation of and the displaying of this sign is a positive step. Having a uniform Rip Current sign at all beach accesses by all entities will assist in public awareness.

Soon, the appropriate numbers of signs will be delivered to your municipality. We would suggest these signs be installed prior to Memorial Day. It is requested you provide a contact person, telephone number and location for delivery.

I must thank you in advance, the TDC, Brevard County Ocean Rescue, and Channel 13 News for taking this project from an idea to fruition!

Summary: On April 1, 2015 the City Council adopted Ordinance No. 1102 increasing the utility tax on the sale and purchase of electricity, metered natural gas, liquid petroleum gas and manufactured gas from 6% to 10%. The purpose of the increase was to fund various Capital Improvements by issuing tax-exempt financing (i.e. bonds, notes and leases).

The City has approved the engineering on several of these projects in advance of receiving tax-exempt financing in order to move forward with these projects in a timely manner. The Internal Revenue Service allows for the proceeds of tax –exempt debt to be allocated to a prior capital expenditure for a period of time after the expenditure is made, but only if a formal declaration of reasonable intention to reimburse the expenditure is made by the governing body.

The proposed Resolution identifies the Capital Improvements and the City’s intent to reimburse the planned expenditures related to these Capital Expenditures with the proceeds from a tax-exempt debt instrument.

The Resolution is intended to be a “housekeeping” item to ensure the City is reimbursed for expenditures relating to the Capital Improvements from tax-exempt proceeds at a later date.

RESOLUTION NO. 955

**A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF SATELLITE BEACH,
BREVARD COUNTY, FLORIDA, REGARDING
REIMBURSEMENT OF CERTAIN COSTS RELATING TO
THE CONSTRUCTION OF VARIOUS CAPITAL
IMPROVEMENTS GENERALLY DESCRIBED HEREIN;
AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE**

WHEREAS, the City of Satellite Beach, Florida (the "City") has incurred and/or will incur various costs regarding the construction of certain capital projects and the repair of certain existing capital improvements, including but not limited to, road resurfacing, Roosevelt Avenue reconstruction, the DeSoto stormwater pond, and the Glenwood stormwater trunk line (the "Projects"); and

WHEREAS, the City has determined it is in its best interest to fund the cost of the Projects and to reimburse such costs from proceeds of tax-exempt debt; and

WHEREAS, the United States Department of Treasury has issued various regulations in regard to reimbursement of governmental costs through the issuance of tax-exempt debt.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SATELLITE BEACH, FLORIDA, as follows:

SECTION 1. It is the intent of the City to reimburse various costs and expenditures relating to the construction of the Project. The City has paid for, and/or reasonably anticipates that it will pay for, such costs and expenditures from monies on deposit in the general fund and/or capital projects fund of the City. It is reasonably expected that reimbursement of such costs and expenditures shall come from the issuance of tax-exempt debt which is not expected to exceed \$2,500,000 aggregate principal amount. It is currently the intention of the City to principally secure such tax-exempt debt by a pledge of and lien upon certain utility tax revenues. The expenditures to be reimbursed shall be consistent with the City's budgetary and financial policy as being the type of expenditures that will be paid on a long-term basis.

SECTION 2. It is the intent of the City that the purpose of this Resolution is to meet the requirements of Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2, and to be a declaration of its official intent under such Section.

SECTION 3. This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

SECTION 4. This Resolution was adopted at a regular meeting of the City Council on the ____ day of _____, 2015.

Summary: On April 1, 2015 the City Council adopted Ordinance No. 1102 increasing the utility tax on the sale and purchase of electricity, metered natural gas, liquid petroleum gas and manufactured gas from 6% to 10%. The purpose of the increase was to fund various Capital Improvements by issuing tax-exempt financing (i.e. bonds, notes and leases).

Ordinance No. 1104 amends the effective date of the utility tax increase from July 1, 2015 to October 1, 2015. The amendment gives the City ample time to meet the notification requirements of all utility companies and notify the Department of Revenue of the utility tax increase. The amendment also allows for the increase to take affect at the beginning of the City's new fiscal year.

ORDINANCE NO. 1104

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF SATELLITE BEACH, BREVARD COUNTY, FLORIDA AMENDING SECTION 58-159 OF THE SATELLITE BEACH CITY CODE, BY AMENDING THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THE RATE INCREASE FOR THE 10% UTILITY TAX ON THE SALE AND PURCHASE OF ELECTRICITY, METERED NATURAL GAS, LIQUID PETROLEUM GAS AND MANUFACTURED GAS; RATIFYING PREVIOUS RATE INCREASE; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE (FIRST READING)

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Satellite Beach recently increased the tax on each and every purchase of electricity, metered natural gas, liquified petroleum gas (either metered or bottled), and manufactured gas (either metered or bottled) from 6% to 10%; and

WHEREAS, the effective date provided in recently adopted Ordinance No. 1102 provided an effective date of July 1, 2015, based upon staff discussions with representatives of Florida Power & Light; and

WHEREAS, it was subsequently determined the effective date should be October 1, 2015 as provided in s. 166.233, Florida Statutes.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SATELLITE BEACH, FLORIDA, as follows:

SECTION 1. The Satellite Beach City Code, is hereby amended to read as follows:

ARTICLE IV. UTILITY TAX

Sec. 58-159. EFFECTIVE DATE OF TAX

The effective date of the tax levied under this Ordinance shall commence with meter readings and sales after ~~July 1~~ October 1, 2015.

SECTION 2. The rate increase from 6% to 10% on each and every purchase of electricity, metered natural gas, liquified petroleum gas (either metered or bottled), and manufactured gas (either metered or bottled) that was approved by Ordinance No. 1102 is ratified and confirmed.

SECTION 3. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

SECTION 4. SEVERABILITY CLAUSE. In the event a court of competent jurisdiction shall hold or determine that any part of this Ordinance is invalid or

unconstitutional, the remainder of the Ordinance shall not be affected thereby and it will be presumed that the City Council for the City of Satellite Beach did not intend to enact such invalid or unconstitutional provision. It shall further be assumed that the City Council would have enacted the remainder of this Ordinance without said invalid and unconstitutional provision thereby causing said remainder to remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 5. REPEAL OF INCONSISTENT PROVISIONS. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 6. This Ordinance was duly passed on first reading at a regular meeting of the City Council on the 15th day of April, 2015 and adopted on the second and final reading at a regular meeting of the City Council on the _____ day of _____, 2015.
